The One Day Conferral, by Brother David Allen

On Saturday, April 29th 2023, Virginia held one-day conferrals all over the state. This initiative is supportive of the Grand Master's goal of making masons this year, and it's a fitting time to get a little bit of background history, and data on the One Day Conferral (ODC). Our current Grand Master Strehle himself became a Master Mason via an ODC.

One-day conferrals are the practice of conferring all three blue lodge degrees in a single day. Generally there is one exemplifying candidate who goes through the process of the degrees, while all others in attendance watch. The ODC has gone by other names as well, such as the one-day class, the Grand Master's Class and even "Blue Lightning".

membership statistical basis, ODCs may outperform the traditional method, as member loss during the multi-month traditional conferral is not known, but is not zero. Supporters tend to focus on the outcome (more Master Masons) not the process.

Both opponents and supporters of the ODC often miss that whether your masonic birthday took 6 months or a single afternoon, that window of time will seem insignificant should you one day receive a 50-year pin. We are only discussing how a man becomes a mason, when the "being" is what matters.

Author Chris Hodapp put it this way: "retention and participation comes down solely to the way that members are treated and mentored once they start attending their lodges, and rests on the interest and dedication of each individual Mason. A one day class conferral of the three lodge degrees doesn't let the lodge duck their responsibility to provide a trusted, knowledgeable mentor to those brethren who need more coaching and education, not less."

Opinions about the practice will differ among free-thinking men. Irrespective of your opinion, all should acknowledge that a brother is a brother no matter how he came through. And now that he's through, what matters is what we all are going to do next for ourselves and lodges. This viewpoint would urge Worshipful Masters to set ODC conferrals off on the right foot by assigning them a mentor immediately, with primary consideration given to how a new member will make friends and find productive, rewarding tasks in the lodge context. For those going through the traditional method, the same advice applies, with a twist: catechism instruction is excellent, but by itself insufficient, and not the same thing as mentorship. The newly made Master Mason can not yet be expected to know how to do this for himself.

The Enochian Temple of Freemasonry, Christopher Knight and Robert Lomas, Uriel's Machine, Fair Winds Press, 1999

The Masonic temple is said to be based on King Solomon's Temple in Jerusalem, and it therefore has the astronomical characteristics of an Enochian Temple.

The room that is the temple faces east, with a door that is usually either north or south of west. In the center of the eastern end sits the worshipful master representing the sunrise at the equinox, and either side of him are two pillars, said to represent the pillars Boaz and Jachin which stood at the porchway of King Solomon's Temple.

Opposite the worshipful master in the west, sits the senior warden, who represents the setting sun at the equinox, and in the south sits the junior warden representing noon.

In the ceiling of an English Masonic temple is a blazing start with the letter "G" at its center. This is said to represent the sun at noon, which is God most high. Around the blazing sun is a five-pointed star which has no explanation within Freemasonry, but it is certainly a representation of Venus' movements around the sun as viewed from Earth. The Grooved Ware People knew that an understanding of the 40-year cycle of Venus, through five of these five-pointed star cycles, was a perfect calendar/clock. In fact, until atomic clocks were invented a few years ago, there was no more accurate means of checking the passage of time than studying the position of Venus against the backdrop of the stars.

There are two other key figures in the Masonic temple who are designated as deacons (a word which comes from the Greek, diakonos meaning "attendant"). The senior of these officers is stationed in the north-east and the junior in the south-west, and it is their job to escort the candidate around the temple during the various ritual. Each carries a six-foot-high staff that is usually termed a "wand" in English Freemasonry.

The "wands" are the measuring rods that the Canaanites and the first Jews called Asherah; named after the goddess who was the mother of the dawn and the dusk. As with the gigantic prehistoric carving of the chalk man at Wilmington in Sussex, the purpose of these asherah is to determine the angles of the sunrise and sunset indicated by the shadows cast from the vertically held staffs.
