

# THE FURNITURE, ORNAMENTS, AND JEWELS OF A LODGE

Discussion Topic for the June Philosophical Society Meeting - *OPEN TO MASONS OF ANY DEGREE*

In the first degree lecture these items are enumerated and explained; they include the (3) items of furniture, (bible, square, compasses); the (3) ornaments (mosaic pavement, indented tessel & blazing star); the (3) lights, (3) immovable jewels (square, plumb, and level), and the (3) movable jewels (rough ashlar, perfect ashlar, and trestleboard). What is so important about the physical objects in lodge that initiation should include an enumeration and description of them?

The June discussion focuses on the items in the physical space of a lodge, their meaning, and why they are the entry point to the degree work.

Questions to structure the discussion, and consider before you come:

1. Why the repetition of 3 in each case?
2. What does it mean for an item to be a jewel?
3. What connections if any are there between the content of the 1st degree and the furniture, ornaments, and jewels?



## THE ROYAL ARCH

Royal Arch Masonry or Capitular Masonry is an appendant body of Freemasonry and the first step in the York Rite system of Masonry. Once considered an integral part of Symbolic Masonry, the Book of Constitutions of the United Grand Lodge of England stated "...pure Antient Masonry consists of three degrees and no more, viz. those of the Entered Apprentice, the Fellow Craft, and the Master Mason including the Supreme Order of the Holy Royal Arch."

The Degrees conferred in the Royal Arch are: Mark Master, Past Master, Most Excellent Master, and Royal Arch. In Virginia, the Cryptic Council Degrees of Select Master and Royal Master are part of the Capitular Degrees and are inserted chronologically after the Past Master Degree.

As in all branches of Freemasonry, philanthropy is an important part of Royal Arch Masonry, the main charity supported by the Grand Chapter of Virginia is the Alzheimer's Association.

Applying to membership is open to all Master Masons in good standing. Petitions are available and requires the signature of two vouchers who are Royal Arch Masons in good standing. Once a member of the Royal Arch you can continue your journey of seeking More Light in Masonry and reveal that which was lost, the goal of our Spiritual and Masonic Teaching.

Today, the Masons' Hall Royal Arch room, one of the few dedicated Royal Arch Rooms in the U.S., sits unused. Several Brethren have expressed interest in joining our local Royal Arch Chapter, Richmond-Washington No. 3-9 with the hope that the chapter may once again hold its meetings in Masons' Hall.
